The Exam

- You will be given an option of writing a description/narrative (story) about a picture
- Or writing a description/narrative (story) in response to a question
- You must know how to write a description and a narrative (story)
- Sometimes both options are the same form, meaning you may be given the option of writing a story about the picture or a story in response to the question
- Sometimes the exam gives you the option of a different form, for example to write a description of the picture and a story in response to the question
- If you choose the question about the image you
 must not say 'in the picture I can see' you should
 imagine you are a/the character in the picture or
 that you are there in the setting/know the character
- The picture should not limit you- you can start with the picture and shift in time or location.
- You can imagine things that are not in the picture!

Always plan a question 5 by thinking about the below questions:

- 1. What things can you see in the picture?
- 2. What could you add to the scene that you can't see in the picture?

3. What additional scenes could you add to a description beyond the one in the picture? Think about change in time /location.

Model Answer

Highlight good vocab and successful devices in the model:

The heavens were painted with intricate flickers of amber, crimson and yellow; the endless sky was alight as the setting sun crafted a masterful image of a roaring fire on its special canvas: it was a work of art to behold. The sun, the master of this beauty, sat comfortably on the horizon. Putting everything else to shame, it was gleeful in its knowledge that the beautiful colour it possessed was impossible to describe or reproduce.

This spectacle was enhanced only by the incandescent water. It glittered and sparkled relentlessly, as though it was competing with the sun and the sky, to achieve the highest accolade for sheer beauty. This lake transcended the usual blue of water; it was translucent and decorated by specs of burnt orange, which it had borrowed from the spectacular sun. The lake lapped gently, nudged by the warm breeze that caressed the scene.

Whilst gentle and careful, this breeze took a more aggressive turn on one thing. The breeze picked it up and threw it around, twisting and twirling it through the air. It ducked, pleated and darted. At first, it moved through the air like a bird but as the sun turned on it, the intruder, which was red and gaudy, was revealed as a wrapper; it was an insult to the breath-taking setting.

Earlier in the day, the sun beat down on the lake, warming the usually ice cold water, making it temperate. The sky was lucid blue; the colour was so intense it was as though it was showing off. The lake, not wishing to be outdone, revealed the treasures it kept hidden. At the bottom of the lake was a tapestry of stones, glistening, sparkling and reflecting like a mass of precious gems and diamonds. This spectacle was taunting. The gems were so close but were so deep and impossible to reach.

People laid blankets and crushed the emerald grass. Without respect, they tore at it out of boredom. They jumped carelessly into the lake with no thought for the jewels that lay beneath. They intoxicated the fragrant air with plumes of smoke from their cigarettes. The flowers, which stood proudly, were torn from

their homes by gleeful children, before they were later cast aside, or drowned in the lake.

As the day progressed, the carnage ensued.

Finally the sun began to set, and the revellers, having selfishly abused the heat the sun had generously chosen to share, retreated back to their homes. They were like that people; they smashed up things and nature and retreated back to their homes, pathetic to the destruction and pollution they caused.

When departing, a man ungratefully dropped a red crisp wrapper onto the scene that had hosted him all day.
